Description: A panel of activist sociologists will present on how activist sociologists can maintain a passion for social justice while ensuring the demands of academia. The presenters will draw on lessons from their roles as scholar-activists with a focus on the arenas in which they work (labor, immigrant rights, community development, global social movement, feminist, communities of color, LGBT communities). Panelists will address new models of research, learning, and practice that are engaging faculty, students, and partners in problem solving to find solutions to community problems; lessons in fulfilling professional academic objectives (e.g. publishing in scholarly journals, getting tenure) while engaging in community-based research; research and practices of developing the classroom as part of the civic realm and that encourage the interconnections between the local and global.
